Ohio Railroad: West Virginia's First Railway

With construction beginning in 1907 and the railroad operating into the 1930's, the Valley River Railroad operated a narrow-gauge line stretching from Mill Creek to Mingo. Its story is typical of the boom and bust railroading of the era. Don will talk about early hopes for a railroad, seeing the dream come true (with a few bumps in the road, including opposition from some local landowners), and the closure of the line. His presentation will include maps, several photos, and stories about the railroad.

Don Teter is a member of the Mingo District Historical Society and president of the Randolph County Historical Society. He has been a self-employed land surveyor for over 35 years, has been a professional continuing education instructor for over 15 years, and became an Assistant Professor of Surveying at Fairmont State University in January 2018. In 1977, he published *Goin' Up Gandy! A History of the Dry Fork Region of Randolph and Tucker Counties, West Virginia.*



#### Item from the Archives

In this edition of the Randolph County Historical Society Newsletter we are presenting an item from the archives. As we work to organize the collection we sometimes come across an item of interest that appeals to our emotions. In other cases the item causes a chuckle and we feel we have to share it with the public. This letter to Mr. Tracy O Fling of Mill Creek WV was from a manager of the feed company he worked for. We are pleased to announce that Mr. Fling did indeed surpass the company's estimation to become the top salesman of feed in his area for most of 1931.



First paragraph as follows:

"Dear Tracy:

I am glad to learn from your letter of January that you have not been compelled to murder any one in West Virginia in order to secure your tonnage. If this becomes necessary, you will head your letters Tracy O. Fling in prison rather than "Tracy O. Fling in person." You have made a good showing but I know you have only scratched the surface and that there is probably 15,000 tons for you in your section of West Virginia for 1931. I sincerely hope you succeed in doing just what you set out to do; that is, make a liar out of yours truly. "
